

- Employment Discrimination (21-S 270A): A vote to strengthen the legal remedies available to address pay inequity for female workers and to ban certain hiring practices which contribute to this inequity. A vote in favor is marked 1. Passed 34-2.
- 3. Medical Privacy (21-S 495A): A vote to allow placing a patient's medical records into a centralized state database without the patient's consent. A vote in opposition is marked i. Passed 28-10.
- 5. Gender Equality (21-S 3): A vote to ban insurers from using gender as a factor in determining health insurance rates. A vote in favor is marked **ii**. Passed 38-0.
- 6. Freedom of Speech (21-S 803): A vote to significantly expand the definition of "hate crimes" and make it easier to prosecute protected speech. A vote in opposition is marked i. Passed 35-2.
- Rights of Immigrants (21-S 990): A vote to codify into law a process for undocumented students to qualify for in-state tuition rates at the state's university and colleges. A vote in favor is marked <sup>11</sup>. Passed 32-6.

- 8. Right to Petition Government (21-S 336A): A vote to remove the authority of Senate committee chairs to require members of the public to testify under oath. A vote in favor is marked <sup>16</sup>. Defeated 9-28.
- 9. Voting Rights (22-S 2007A): A vote to expand pre-Election Day voting opportunities and reduce barriers to voting by mail. A vote in favor is marked <sup>16</sup>. Passed 31-6.
- 10. Drug Reform (22-S 2430Aam): A vote to legalize recreational marijuana. A vote in favor is marked <sup>↓</sup>. Passed 32-6.
